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From Rabbi Perlman



On April 17, 2008, New Yorkers were invited to participate in a special celebration of April being **National Poetry** Month. On that day, the NYC Department

of Education, the Department of Cultural Affairs, and the Mayor's Office sponsored the 6th annual "Poem in Your Pocket Day." All those who wished to do so placed a poem in their pocket and carried it around with them so that they could share it with family, friends, co-workers, classmates, and even strangers on the street. Though there were several official gatherings for "Poem in Your Pocket Day," the most exciting part of the celebration was the prospect of uniting an entire metropolitan area through words of poetry. Ostensibly, a person standing next to another person at a random bus stop could turn to him or her and start a conversation simply by asking about the poem in the pocket.

Rabbinically speaking, what was most interesting to me about "Poem in Your Pocket Day" was the idea of people deciding upon a single poem that they would consider their own. What would a person choose? Something

insightful? Deep? Beautiful? Philosophical? Funny? Clearly, it would have to be something reflective of one's personality and outlook on life.

In a way, the Jewish people are now in the midst of a period of time that celebrates a genre of literary work. At the beginning of June, we will be celebrating the holiday of Shavuot. This is the festival that traditionally marks the giving of the Torah at Mount Sinai. Throughout the seven weeks leading up to Shavuot, many in the Jewish community focus on the gift and blessing of learning. Special texts are explored, insight gleaned, and thought given to the importance of study and of Torah for our people.

And so, in celebration of this season - taking a cue from the good people of New York - I thought it might be fun to find seven personally meaningful Jewish writings - one for each week leading up to Shavuot. If I had seven pockets within which to hold some special texts - I think these are the seven that I would choose:

"And God created man and woman in God's image." (Genesis 1:27, adapted)

"Reb Zusya once taught: 'When I come to the Heavens for my judgment, they will not ask me why I was not like Moses, for I am not Moses. But they will ask me why I was not Zusya.'" (Hasidic)

"If I am not for myself, who will be for me? And if I am only for myself, what am I? And if not now, when?" (Ethics of the Fathers 1:24)

" This is what the Holy One said to Israel: 'My children, what do I seek from you? I seek no more than that you love one another and honor one another.'" (Midrash Tanna d'Bai Eliahu)

"The important thing is not to stop questioning." (Albert Einstein)

"(And God says:) 'This is My covenant with you....the words which I have put into your mouth shall not depart from you...nor from your children, nor from your children's children henceforth and forever. " (Isaiah 59:21)

"Judaism is a celebration. Being Jewish means learning how to celebrate." (Abraham Joshua Heschel)

Our rabbis were clear. The teachings of our people are intended to be kept not only close at hand (in our library, in our houses of study, or even in our pocket), but also in our heart. Once there, these words might guide us in how we live each and every day teaching us/reminding us what it means to live lives filled with compassion, patience, appreciation, humility, love, and peace.

With warmest wishes during these weeks of Torah celebration - a pathway in time leading us all back to the base of Mount Sinai.

We are delighted that the Synagogue Council of Massachusetts will be presenting K'lal Yisrael Awards this year to Patti and Louis Grossman and their siblings, Amy and Rick Sands, Linda and Ken Polivy, and Rachel and Bryan Koplow.

This award is presented to individuals who exemplify the spirit of K'lal Yisrael and help strengthen our Jewish Community. In addition that evening Dr. Sidney P. Kadish will be presented with the community service award for his outstanding leadership in strengthening Jewish communal life.

Sabbatical
I wanted to drop you a
quick note to let you
know how much I appreciated the opportunity
to have had a sabbatical
and fill you in on a little
bit of what I was up to.

"The Lord spoke to Moses on Mount Sinai, saying: 'Speak to the people of Israel and say to them: When you enter the land that I am giving you, the land shall observe a Sabbath for the Lord. Six years you shall prune your vineyard, and gather in their yield; but in the seventh year there shall be a sabbatical of complete rest for the land, a Sabbath for the Lord...'" (Lev. 25:1-4) The text goes on to explain that while the land lies fallow during the sabbatical year, the people are allowed to gather for themselves any fruit of the land that grows on its own without cultivation, pruning or other tending. Since Temple Beth Shalom granted me this opportunity to renew myself, as the farmers gathered the fruits of the sabbatical land, so, too, will TBS gather the fruits of my educator sabbatical. I attended to my rest partly through thoughtful exploration of best

practices of many congregations around the country and those of secular public primary, elementary and high schools. My gleanings will enrich our education program for students of all ages and abilities. I look forward to unrolling more details in the coming months.

In addition to my best practices exploration. I worked with Habitat for Humanity on the West Newton Habitat duplex, wielding a hammer, raising the second floor joists (floor supports) and helping to make two families dreams of home ownership a reality. I am very much looking forward to our Needham home getting underway! It will be a rich experience for all those who are able to engage in this project in any capacity. Timing could also not have been better for exploring the Bible through an ecological lens. This full semester Hebrew College course is the first of its kind, and it is quite fascinating discussing, debating and considering how ancient wisdom has or has not informed human behavior since creation. As TBS engages in an ecological evaluation and study of its own, the Bible is surely a rich resource to access for basing our decisions in Torah and Judaism.


School Survey

The 49 day period between Pesach and Shavuot - the Omer; is when we count the days and weeks between those two holidays in order to remember that our redemption from slav-

ery was not complete until receiving the Torah. We are commanded to count up - not down - until we actually reach the 50th day; Shavuot.

The phrase "to count" which is central to the omer can be defined in a variety of ways for all of us at Temple Beth Shalom. If we stand up to be "counted" at TBS we are adding up,

checking over one by one, the people that make our Temple the sacred space that it is for so many. From the clergy, to the professional and support staff, to our volunteers; collectively we contribute to the extraordinary community that we are. It was an incredible weekend for me, both as a Jewish adult and as a Jewish educator. I was so moved by the experience that I would like to share my thoughts.

During Friday night Shabbat services, I looked around the room to see the radiant faces of Children Center children singing songs and prayers with confidence and sheer enjoyment. I saw

school age children chant the V'Ahavta prayer with poise and confidence. Families welcomed Shabbat with prayer and song together. Our service was held in the Camp Eisner library - a warm intimate, and beautiful setting for this magical moment.

Saturday morning, my role was to lead the youngest of our Kallah participants in Torah study. We explored the power of "words." For them and for me, the simple idea that they could have "Torah Study" - just like the adults - was exciting! As always, I was in awe by what the children taught me about the depth of their understanding and respect for Torah. We talked about "holy words," "nice words," and "not so nice" words; and how on Shabbat, it's even more important to be aware of the words that we are using with others. The children came up with lists of words that were nice words, such as "love," "help," and

"are you okay?" and whispered just a few words that were not so nice. We talked about those words and how terrible those words can make us feel. We brainstormed what to do when someone says those kinds of words to us. They had some great ideas, such as walk away, ignore them, and ask an adult for

Then, we talked about holy words. The children came up with words like God, Shabbat, Torah, and then interestingly, someone said, "Friend." I asked, "Do you think friend is in the Torah?" One child replied that she didn't know, since she has not read from the Torah yet. Many of the children said that they thought friend was, in fact, in the Torah. Developmentally, this makes sense. To a young child, friends are the first close connections they are making outside of their families and they are incredibly meaningful, sacred. So much so, that in a four year old classroom, children will choose an activity based on which children are playing there rather than on what they truly want to be doing.

For young children to acquire and maintain these friendships, they need new skills such as the ability to problem solve, put themselves in "someone else's shoes" (a real challenge for anyone, let alone a young child), how to engage another person in play, and how to resolve conflicts. If we think about it, many of these skills can be challenging for adults as well! As children are engaging in the thought processes necessary to interact in these complex relationships, they are developing a self-image, figuring out what makes other people "tick" and learning to trust others. This is an intense internal process. Perhaps this is why the children thought that friend was a holy word!

Since young children, as well as older children, feel that friendships are holy, we as adults should respect these relationships as such and support children in developing the problem solving skills, and the analytical and observational skills that our children will need to support them in choosing friends that they can trust and respect and those friends who will respect them! I found that this was a great topic for our Shabbat retreat together. I can't help think that it might be a good topic for any Shabbat table talk.

Reduce Hot Water Use and Save Money!

For most homes, approximately 15% of home energy use goes to heating water.

Installing low-flow showerheads and faucet aerators is the most effective way to conserve water and electricity at once. You can reduce your home water consumption by as much as 50%, and cut energy costs for heating the water by the same amount.

For maximum water efficiency, select a showerhead with a flow rate of less than 2.5 gpm. Showerheads installed before 1992 may have flow rates as high as 5.5 gpm.

Typically, new kitchen faucet aerators restrict flow rates to 2.2 gpm, whereas new bathroom faucet aerators restrict flow rates from 1.5 to 0.5 gpm. For maximum water efficiency, purchase aerators that have flow rates of no more than 1.0 gpm.

Fix leaks in faucets, showerheads or pipes. Check for a toilet leak by putting a few drops of food coloring in the toilet tank.

If, after 15 minutes, some of the coloring seeps into toilet bowl, there is a leak.

Washing Tips:

Fully load washers before running. For significant additional savings, hang dry laundry and air-dry dishes. When possible, wash laundry in cold water. Shift energy intensive tasks, such as laundry and dish washing, to off-peak energy demand hours (late evenings and weekends).

When replacing old washers, look for Energy Star models.

Consider solar when replacing your water heater. On average, a solar water heater will reduce your water heating bills from 50%-80%. Also, because the sun is free, you're protected from future fuel shortages and price hikes.

Youth Education



Over the weekend of April 11-13, I had the pleasure of traveling with a group of our eighth and ninth graders to New York City. We spent two and a half very full days

exploring the city, learning about the Jewish experience there, and eating many, many delicious bagels.

Our weekend began early Friday morning, when we departed Boston, armed with luggage, cameras... and bagels. We arrived in New York and quickly began our touring - we headed far downtown to take the ferry to Ellis Island. After waiting in a very long line (during which time we were able to enjoy a rousing rendition of Hava Nagila on the steel drums, as per our group's request) we finally boarded the ferry. Once we arrived at Ellis Island, we had the opportunity to witness firsthand the immigrant experience coming to New York during the early 1900s. The kids had a chance to explore the grounds and the many exhibits, and some even discovered information about members of their own family who came through Ellis Island. The excursion perfectly framed what would be our discussion over the rest of the weekend - the New York Jewish experience over the past 100 years.

After we left Ellis Island, we had the opportunity to attend Shabbat services at congregation B'nei Jeshrun on the city's Upper West Side. As a part of services, the kids sang and even danced through the aisles of the sanctuary with members of the congregation. With a special greeting from the rabbis there, we felt welcomed into what was truly a unique, meaningful Shabbat worship experience.

We awoke the next morning to begin a day packed with sites to see and things to do. After our all-important New York bagel breakfast, we once again traveled downtown, beginning our day on Wall Street. There, we talked about the "American dream" - a dream that so many of those same ancestors who came through Ellis Island were trying to obtain. From Wall Street, we walked a few blocks over to Ground Zero, the former site of the World Trade Center towers. We walked through the memorial currently at St. Paul's church across the street from the site, and we were able talk to the kids about their memories of September 11th, and how much this tragedy has since affected all of our lives. In the face of reminders of such tragedy, it was truly a beautiful moment to see how much our kids came together as a group to think back and reflect on what had happened.

We then traveled to the Lower East Side. Chinatown and Little Italy to continue our talks about both the Jewish immigrant experience and also today's immigrant experience in the city. After some delicious gelato (no bagels here!), shopping and free time, we headed back to our hotel to prepare for our night on

the town - seeing the Lion King on Broadway and late-night dessert at the Stardust Diner. Lion King was incredible, and the Stardust Diner - the quintessential kitschy New York diner, right in Times Square, where the waiters and waitresses stand on tables and sing show tunes with full patron participation was the perfect, fun way to unwind after a long day of walking and learning.

We got up the next morning for our final outing - a walking tour of Jewish Harlem. Certainly, not your typical tourist destination. The tour was a wonderful way to cap off our weekend with a somewhat different view of New York. A special tour guide met us there, an incredibly knowledgeable, impressive educator who introduced himself to us simply as "Joe." Joe led us through Harlem, to see sites of old synagogues, former Kosher restaurants and stores, and even to Langston Hughes' former home. It was the perfect way to end our weekend of learning and exploration.

The trip truly was a wonderful experience. After sadly having to decline requests to "just stay another day or two if we call our parents and they say it's ok?" we boarded the bus and headed back home to Needham, our stomachs full of bagels and our heads and hearts full with new knowledge and insight, new friendships, and most of all, an ever-heightened appreciate for the expression "I ♥ New York."

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
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
