So many have contributed to what is now over \$7.6 million in support and many more have scheduled conversations about both our building plans and the possibility of generous family donations. Soon, we hope to have every one of our perspectives, hearts and gifts accounted for and each name engraved in our alphabetical listing on the walls of our Mikdash.

## TBS in Israel: A Traveler's Diary, Part 2

Since my family and I returned from Israel a few days ago, many people have asked, "What was the highlight of the trip?" My response has been, "Truly, every day was a highlight!"

Fast-paced and exciting, the trip was a whirlwind of interesting sights and facts about Israel's history and landscape, meaningful moments shared with family and friends, and just plain fun.

Led by Rabbi Jay and Emily, our group of 78 people included adults, children and teens. The group was divided into two buses, each with its own charismatic tour guide. While much of our time was spent riding and touring with our own bus, there was also plenty of time to share meals and socialize with the entire group. A unique sense of community quickly developed. We began to feel as if the rest of the world had stopped and we were in our own traveling bubble.

One often hears that visiting Israel is like coming home, and indeed I felt that way immediately upon arriving at our first stop, Mevasseret Zion, a Reform synagogue that overlooks Jerusalem's Old City. Tired and weary from the hours of travel, our group was welcomed for Shabbat services and a lovely oneg. The beautiful, familiar melodies of the service; the warmth of the rabbi and congregants; and the presence of Sasha Kopp, a former TBS educator and mentor to my daughter Juliana, made me feel as if the long plane ride had just melted away. My transition from Needham to Israel was seamless.

The ten days of touring included something for everyone. My husband Ken is a history buff and he relished learning the details about Israel's founders, its wars and hard-won borders. My nine-year old son Daniel enjoyed bouncing up and down on a jeep ride through the Golan Heights, seeing old bunkers where Syrian fighters hid, and practically touching the cows that came up close to our passing jeeps. Juliana, ever the teenager, soaked up the foreign culture, noting the "cool boots" and "perfect hair" donned by the glamorous Israeli girls, including the soldiers who were only a few years older than she is.

As for me, I loved everything about this trip and perhaps most treasured the small moments of personal reward

and connection. Laughing at a joke with friends to pass the time on the airplane...placing tiny folded prayers into cracks in the Western Wall once again after my first experience 27 years ago, this time with my precious daughter by my side...Havdalah led by Rabbi Jay, with Emily playing the guitar...the triumph I experienced reaching the top of Masada (albeit among the last of the climbers)...floating in the Dead Sea...seeing the gorgeous Chagal windows at Hadassah Hospital and learning about their history...watching Daniel play touch football with his Hebrew teacher from TBS, Aaron Gurvis, and ten other boys at Kibbutz K'far Blum...hearing the moving story of our young jeep guide who had lost his wife to terrorism...enjoying delicious, relaxed dinners with old friends and new friends...and finally, visiting the spot where Yitzak Rabin was assassinated after hosting a rally for peace, and wondering, sadly, what might have been had he lived.

Many people in our group spent part of our free day in Tel Aviv visiting with Israeli family and friends. Our family had a special experience having dinner with one of Juliana's counselors from Crane Lake Camp. Noam is Israeli and finished her army service a year ago. She told us in the army, her job had been to train younger soldiers to drive and operate a tank. Our jaws dropped as we remembered the size of the tanks we had seen at Latrun, Israel's armed corps museum, the previous day. Noam, like many young Israelis, enjoyed the camaraderie she experienced in the army, and she took pride in defending Israel.

It was fascinating to hear Noam's stories. She also had questions for us; she wanted to know if we had enjoyed Israel and, as Americans, whether we felt at home there. I said I felt very at home in Israel, and Juliana declared without hesitation, "I feel more Jewish here!"

Looking back, that was a climactic moment, and maybe even the highlight of the trip - "I feel more Jewish!" she said.

Perfect, I thought. Priceless.

I never thought of myself as a singer until after my first day at a Circle Song workshop (a workshop that I attended outside of TBS led by Bobby McFerrin at the Omega Institute) where 200 people came together to explore improvisation through song. I came back feeling the need to sing -- not so others could hear my voice, but for joy and the want for others to feel the same.

Something special happens when people sing together.

When the invitation came to sing with Cantor Jonas in the TBS *Kolot Kehillah* (voices of the community), pop-up choir, I entered the date into my calendar and looked forward to it for weeks. The evening came and rehearsal alone exceeded my expectations. I felt a spiritual connection through singing in Hebrew and in rounds. When I returned to my seat, I felt a new sense of community -- not just with those who also sang -- but by those sitting around me who welcomed me back with smiles and expressions of gratitude for

the music. I immediately felt a new connection to a congregation I've been a member of for 10 years.

I've returned since and I intend to do so as often as possible. Won't you join me?

### **Needham's Art in Bloom**

On Saturday, March 7<sup>th</sup> through Sunday, March 8<sup>th</sup>, the Temple Beth Shalom Garden Club will be presenting the Needham's seventh annual Art in Bloom exhibit. It will feature 60+ pieces of incredible Needham High School student artwork with creative floral interpretations by Garden Club members.

The Garden Club's decision to model their event after The Boston Museum of Fine Arts' Art in Bloom concept was a perfect way to help them achieve the goal of creating a community event that people of all ages could enjoy together. Even so, the members of the TBS Garden Club never imagined seven years ago just how welcomed and successful Needham's Art in Bloom would become today! Fortunately, the Needham Cultural Council and the Dedham Institute for Savings both did. It was their grant programs that financed the early years of this free multi-generational community event. Roche Bros. has been the prime sponsor ever since.

According to Needham Reference Librarian and Program Specialist Gay Dennett, over 2,500 people came to the Needham Public Library last year during the first weekend in March to experience this special free event. Originally, the exhibit mainly attracted Needham residents, but since the TBS Garden Club received the Special Achievement Award from the Garden Club Federation of Massachusetts for the successful creation and execution of Needham's Art

in Bloom, the exhibit draws people from near and far. Needham resident Suzanne S. expressed the sentiments of many locals who love coming back each year and watching it grow when she wrote, "This is my fourth year attending and I wouldn't miss this for the world! Maryalice S. commented in the guestbook,



"We're so glad we came from Belmont. The student artists are very talented and the garden club captured the artist's expressions so well."

Needham's first Art in Bloom consisted of 27 displays. By 2011, the number of displays doubled! In addition to 44 student artists, there were 11 special tercentennial exhibits under the collective title "Needham Notables: Then and Now." This special exhibition featured floral interpretations of notable historic and contemporary Needham artists and authors

(including TBS congregants Rose Lewis and Jim Hirsch) in honor of the town's 300<sup>th</sup> birthday celebration. A special photo collage of Needham's Art in Bloom 2011 was proudly submitted by the TBS Garden Club to be included in the town's most recent time capsule for future generations to see.

Enthusiasm for this event from the community has been evident from the beginning. Since the exhibit's inception, Needham High School art and photography teacher Shireen Yadollahpour has coordinated the collection of pieces with the faculty of the Fine Arts Department. Dennett arranged for the Needham Public Library to serve as the main venue. From the first year, The Senior Center and Town Hall provided space for a small Friday preview to kick-off the entire exhibit. Needham resident Jean H. was truly captivated after viewing the art and flowers. She described the sentiments of many visitors in the guest book when she said, "What a wonderful demonstration of the talent in Needham. The students' work is impressive and thought-provoking. The floral demonstrations are beautifully creative and inspiring. This is a lovely example of informal education combined with community spirit. Thank you!"

It's breathtaking to see the entire library blooming with art and flowers paired together. Come and see for yourself!

### Mayim T'fillah: An Opportunity for Prayer, Reflection, Community Building, and Learning

It is Monday afternoon, and the *Mayim* 2nd-5th graders are in the sanctuary with Stephen, our *t'fillah* (prayer) leader. They have just finished chanting

the Amidah prayer, and Stephen invites the children to take two minutes to pray silently. Some of the children close their eyes; others flip through the pages of their siddurim (prayer books). When the two minutes have passed, Stephen leads the group in singing Oseh Shalom, the prayer for peace. Then he asks: "There are a lot of prayers that we chant out loud together. Why do you think we also pray silently



during *t'fillah*?" Several hands go up, and Stephen calls on the children one-by-one. Answers include:

- "Because maybe sometimes we have something to pray about that is private, that we don't want anyone else to hear."
- "Because then we can think about our day and the things that happened just to us."
- "Because when we pray silently, we can pray about a lot of things at once."
- "So we can think about what we are thankful for and thank God."
- "Maybe because we can concentrate more when it is quiet."

The answers keep coming, and it is clear that the children have given this some thought. This is just one example of the many ways in which *Mayim* children are learning and reflecting on prayer each and every time they come to *Mayim*.

Every week, children in *Mayim* spend 30 minutes of their day in *T'fillah* (a prayer service) in the sanctuary. *T'fillah* is led by one of our talented songleaders

(Stephen Brickman, Nick Burka, Matt Emmer, and Sara Miller), who infuse the experience with music, singing, brief *kavanot* (intentions), and opportunities to reflect on the experience.

Parents are invited to join us for *Mayim t'fillah* each week. Many of our families have shared with us that joining their children for *t'fillah* is a highlight of their week.

Our goals for *Mayim t'fillah* are:

- To develop the children's capacity for a meaningful prayer experience, including an understanding of the meanings of our prayers and the reasons why people pray
- To practice singing, chanting, or reciting our t'fillot (prayers) on a regular basis a reflection of our tradition's invitation to engage this practice regularly
- To learn melodies, styles, and "prayer choreography" regularly used at TBS
- To provide older children with opportunities to lead prayer.

For the first half of the year, children in grades K-1 have their own separate *t'fillah* experience, which includes lots of singing, hand motions, and abbreviated prayers. Over the course of the year, we introduce these younger children to the sanctuary and to prayer, gradually adding to the number and length of the prayers we explore. Children in grades 2-5





end their day with a *t'fillah* experience that includes full-length prayers, brief discussions, age-appropriate songs, and opportunities to lead prayers.

February is an important month in the children's *t'fillah* journey in *Mayim*. After school vacation, the children in grades K-1 will begin joining the children in grades 2-5 for *t'fillah*. We have been preparing them for this transition by introducing them to the *siddur* and gradually adding new prayers to their repertoire. We have also been preparing the older children to welcome the kindergarten and first graders into their *t'fillah*. Our 4<sup>th</sup> and 5th graders have been preparing to be "*T'fillah* Buddies" and will be paired with the younger children to help them navigate

the *siddur* and follow along with the service. The 4<sup>th</sup> and 5th graders will also take a more active role in leading prayers and songs, which is a wonderful opportunity for them to practice the Hebrew reading and chanting skills that they have been developing in their small-group Hebrew classes.

It is always inspiring to hear the children's thoughts about specific prayers, about God, and about why people pray. It is delightful to hear their voices raised in song. And it is a blessing to see families praying and singing together as part of the *Mayim* day.

#### **ALL ABOUT HAVDALAH**

The *Havdalah* ceremony marks the end of Shabbat each week. It is a short ceremony that includes only four blessings. It is easy to do at home!

#### The Havdalah Ceremony

You will need: A cup of grape juice, a bowl or bag of cinnamon, cloves, or other sweet spices, and a *Havdalah* candle (see below for how to make one).

#### The Blessing over Wine or Grape Juice

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֱלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא פִּרִי הַגָּפֵן.

Baruch atah, Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha'olam, boray pri hagafen.

Blessed are You, Adonai, Ruler of the universe, Creator of the fruit of the vine.

#### The Blessing over Spices

ַבָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יִיָ, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֱלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא מִינֵי בְשָּׁמִים.

Baruch atah, Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha'olam, boray minay vesamim.

Blessed are You, *Adonai*, Ruler of the universe, Creator of the different spices.

#### The Blessing over the Candle

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, בּוֹרֵא מְאוֹרֵי הַאֵשׁ.

Baruch atah, Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha'olam, boray me'oray ha'aysh.

Blessed are You, Adonai, Ruler of the universe, Creator of the fire's lights.

#### The Blessing over Havdalah

בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, אֱלֹהֵינוּ מֶלֶךְ הָעוֹלָם, הַמַּבְדִיל בֵּין קֹדֶשׁ לְחוֹל, בֵּין אוֹר לְחֹשֶׁךְ, בֵּין יִשְׂרָאֵל לָעַמִּים, בֵּין יוֹם הַשְּׁבִיעִי לְשֵׁשֶׁת יְמֵי הַמַּעֲשֶׂה. בָּרוּךְ אַתָּה יְיָ, הַמַּבִדיל בַּין קֹדֵשׁ לְחוֹל.

Baruch atah, Adonai, Elohaynu melech ha'olam, hamavdil bayn kodesh lechol bayn or lechoshechbayn Yisrael la'amim bayn yom hashevi'i leshayshet yemay hama'aseh. Baruch atah, Adonai, hamavdil bayn kodesh lechol.

Blessed are You, *Adonai*, Ruler of the universe, who separates between the holy and the everyday; between the light and dark; between Israel and the other nations; between the seventh day and the six days of the week. Blessed are You, God, who separates between the holy and the profane.

## How to Make a Havdalah Candle from Leftover Chanukah Candles



Make sure you ask an adult for help!

- 1. Gather all materials:
  - Two Chanukah candles (including extras in case you make mistakes)
  - o a source of boiling water
  - a disposable bowl
  - o paper towels
  - o matches or a lighter
  - o a disposable fork
- 2. Ask an adult to boil water.
- Select two candles in different colors and place them in the bowl.
- 4. Ask an adult to pour boiling water on top of the candles and allow them to sit for 30-60 seconds.
- 5. When the candles are soft and flexible, have an adult use the fork to remove the candles from the water.
- 6. Twist the candles together and smoosh them so they stick
- Let the candles cool and dry on the paper towel. Do not touch them for at least ten minutes.

Note: You can also use three candles and braid them together, but this is difficult and requires hotter water.

Family and friends are finally no longer surprised by the fact that I start cooking and freezing in February.

Just a few years ago, a friend of mine asked me to go to a Beth Shalom Garden Club meeting with her. The next thing I knew, I was joining! I always looked forward to the monthly meetings, and eventually I was elected President. The Garden Club is filled with very talented people who want to pass along their knowledge. It is very relaxing to learn about flowers and create arrangements. I am not a professional gardener, but there is no right or wrong when working with flowers. In fact, it is a lot like being Jewish in that you can make what you want out of it.

I hope that by teaching other members about garden club I am making a positive contribution to the temple community. Hopefully new garden club members will discover a similar passion as the one that I found from the moment that I initially joined.

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




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
